## W.E.B. Du Bois on Crime: Rethinking the Beginnings of American Criminology

"And of course the prime victim of {academic} exclusion and prejudice was W.E.B. Du Bois who, as long as he lived, was recognized as a "Negro leader," a "Negro activist," and begrudgingly, as a competent "Negro intellectual." Only twenty years after his death does the academic establishment begin—an I emphasize begin—to recognize his contributions as a leading American intellectual of the twentieth century (Platt, 1990:43)."

Young and Greene (1995), in their recent article, highlight the importance of incorporating African-American perspectives in the criminology and criminal justice (C/CJ) curriculum. Their article not only discusses the importance of the inclusion of African-American perspectives, but provides a review of those African American scholars whose writings should be included in the C/CJ curriculum. In presenting their findings, Young and Greene divide African American writings into three periods: early writings, later writings, and contemporary writings. The first person listed under early writings is scholar and activist W.E.B. Du Bois, who is the focus of this essay.

Since Du Bois's life has been the focus of many publications (see, for example, Du Bois, 1968; Lewis, 1993; Marble, 1986), only his educational training is mentioned here. Du Bois was born in Great Barrington, Massachusetts on February 23, 1868. He was educated in the public schools of Massachusetts, where he was an outstanding student. Following high school, Du Bois attended Fisk University in Nash-

ville, Tennessee. He graduated cum Laude in 1888, and enrolled at Harvard, where he received another A.B. degree in philosophy (1890), an M.A. in History (1892) and a Ph.D. in History (1895). Du Bois was the first African American to receive a Ph.D. at Harvard. In addition, he spent two years in Germany at the University of Berlin.

The purpose of this discussion is twofold and will be presented as two parts of a series. First in the series is an argument to expand on Gabbidon's argument for the inclusion of W.E.B. Du Bois's writings in the scholarly C/CJ literature by examining closely on of Du Bois's criminological publications. Second, in the series (January/February 1999) is a comparative analysis of Du Bois's 1901 publication, "The Spawn of Slavery: The Convict Lease System in the South" with William Chambliss's 1964 publication, "A Sociological Analysis of the Law of Vagrancy." Chambliss's publication was selected because it is widely regarded as a classic example of a conflict/Marxist analysis. By way of comparative analysis, the author aims to show the theoretical underpinnings of one of Du Bois's most theoretically oriented crime related publications. Even though Du Bois's analysis is set both in a different country and era, it represents a remarkably similar analysis to that of Chambliss.

### Du Bois on Crime

Recently, the substance of Du Bois's work has begun to find its way into several conference presentations (see for example, Gabbidon and Thompson, 1994; Gabbidon, 1994; Tatum, 1995) and scholarly publications (see for example,

Hawkins, 1995; Young and Greene, 1995; Gabbidon, 1996). These presentations and publications suggest that Du Bois was a noteworthy contributor to the early development of criminology in the United States.

References to Du Bois's crime-related writings, however, are scant compared to the mass of material on his life. There have been, however, a few early and several recent comments regarding Du Bois crime-related publications. Sutherland (1924) and Sellin (1928) provide two early references to Du Bois's writings on crime. Sutherland, and his first edition of his classic text *Criminology* (1924), refers to Du Bois's *The Philadelphia Negro* (1899) to illustrate patterns of African-American crime. Sellin (1928) also referred to the earlier publications of Du Bois while discussing African American crime. Gunnar Myrdal, in his classic *An American Dilemma* (1944), relied heavily on Du Bois's writings to discuss the American Negro and their involvement in the justice system (see Myrdal, 1944:524-569). Later, African-American scholar, E. Franklin Frazier, while reviewing literature on African-American crime, noted that Du Bois viewed the etiology of African American crime in the same light as the Chicago School scholars (see Frazier, 1949). Following these early references to Du Bois's crime-related publications, it was not until the early 1970s that the substance of these writings were again carefully considered.

Green (1973: 1338), recognizing this oversight in the discussion of Du Bois's writings on crime, suggested that the two foremost scholars on Du Bois during that era, Francis L. Broderick and Elliot M. Rudwick, failed to address Du Bois's contributions to criminology. Because of this oversight, Green developed a chapter to focus on Du Bois publications on crime. He focused on many books, journal articles, and editorials from Du Bois's years as editor of *The Crisis* magazine of the NAACP. From Green's analysis of these publications, he concluded that Du Bois recognized four basic causes of African American crime: 1) the convict lease system, 2) the attitude of the courts towards blacks, 3) the increasing lawlessness and mob-actions of whites, and 4) the unnatural separation of the races (1973: 384). Furthermore, Green identified several other factors that Du Bois believed contributed to crime including: increased complexity of life, industrial competition, urban migration, and economic and moral strain (1973: 384). These findings by Green represent an early and significant analysis of Du Bois publications on crime. After discussing his findings, Green labeled Du Bois one of America's first scientific criminologists (see Green 1973:338).

Following Green's discussion, several other publications cited Du Bois's writings on crime, but did not include extensive analyses (see, for example, Caldwell and Greene, 1980; Davis, 1975; Greene, 1979; Simms and Myers, 1988; Duffee and Bailey, 1991). More recently, several works by criminologists

have revisited the writings of Du Bois. Young and Greene (1995), for example devote part of their article to the review of several Du Bois's writings on crime. They argue that Du Bois's writings preceded mainstream criminological thinkers and included the following thematic content: social disorganization as a result of slavery and emancipation, African-American criminal class, crime statistics and economics and crime (Young and Greene, 1995:99). Hawkins (1995), commenting on Du Bois's analysis of African American crime in Philadelphia notes:

Du Bois and others saw their task to be that of providing social explanations for the comparatively high rate of black crime. For Du Bois the over involvement of Philadelphia blacks in crime was a *natural* product not of their genetic makeup, but of the degradation and social disruption caused by slavery... (Hawkins, 1995:15).

Elsewhere, Gabbidon (1996) has provided an in-depth discussion of several of Du Bois's publications on crime. The thesis of this essay also supports the argument that Du Bois should be included in the mainstream C/CJ curriculum.

**Editor's Note:** The discussion of the importance of W.E.B. Du Bois to the field of criminology is continued in the second part of this series. Specifically, part two of this series to be printed in the January/February 1999 issue of the newsletter, is devoted to a comparison of the academic significance of the Du Bois analysis of the convict lease system in the United States as consistent with the quality of the work of William Chambliss on the analysis of the law of vagrancy.

## A New Forum for Penological Scholarship:

### *Punishment & Society: The International Journal of Penology*

by David Garland, New York University

Punishment has always presented practical challenges and moral dilemmas, just as it has always exerted a profound fascination, whether for social theorists or for the literary and popular imagination. At the present time, however, penal issues have taken on a significance for politics and for popular culture that make the business of crime and punishment one of the most pressing problems of our age. In this context, the effectiveness of imprisonment, the ethics of the death penalty, the scope for restorative sanctions, or the appropriate framework for governing sentencing behaviour - cease to be matters purely for specialists and become relevant to everyone.

There is reason, too, to believe that our penal institutions are currently undergoing a profound structural transformation that is changing the meaning of criminal justice in ways that we are only beginning to understand. The erosion of correctionalist ideologies; the turn to expressive justice and punitive measures; the return of the victim; the stress upon public protection and the management of risk; the changing objectives of community corrections and custodial institutions; the politicization of penal policy discourse; the drift towards mass imprisonment.....all of these converging trends seem to suggest a field that is being extensively reconfigured, though no singular logic appears to explain quite how.

Twenty five years ago, academics, practitioners and informed commentators shared a set of assumptions about the correctionalist framework that shaped criminal justice and penal practice. There was a settled, self-conscious, institutional field and the debates and disagreements that occurred operated within its discursive parameters. Penological text-books and practitioner training manuals could articulate the premises that guided penal practice and confidently transmit this culture from one generation to the next. Today, for better or for worse, we lack any such agreement, or any clear sense of the big picture. Policy development tends to be volatile and contradictory. No one is quite sure what is radical and what is reactionary. Private prisons, victim's impact statements, community notification laws, sentencing guidelines, electronic monitoring, punishments in the community - these and dozens of other issues take us into unfamiliar territory where the ideological lines are far from clear and where the old assumptions are an unreliable guide.

The collapse of a long-established institutional framework tends to prompt intellectual ferment and innovation as old habits of thought and recipes for action lose their epistemological privileges and institutional supports. It is not, then, surprising that the traditional assumptions of a correctionalist, technicist penology have been increasingly disrupted over the past two decades by more critical and diverse ways of thinking about penalty. Practical penology has converged with historical, sociological and philosophical work in a way that has produced a whole new level of intellectual debate, and a whole new literature of scholarship in the penal realm, as scholars have tried to make sense of the changing terrain and the social and historical dynamics that lie beneath it.

The new centrality of penal politics and the changing configuration of the field, together with the growth over the last two decades of a vigorous and impressive body of new penological scholarship, made it seem timely and important to establish a forum for discussion and debate. The idea was to continue the important tradition of practical penology - analyzing, evaluating and criticizing contemporary penal practice - but to engage that tradition in a conversation with the broader analyses produced by scholars working from disciplinary perspectives outside of the penal domain - in sociology, history, philosophy and cultural studies. In establishing *Punishment & Society* my co-editors and I hope to promote that conversation and, in time, contribute to a more informed and perspicacious level of public discourse and criticism in penal affairs. We very much hope that members of the ASC will join us in this venture - by subscribing to the journal and by submitting their work for publication.


