RECENT CHANGES AT THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

With the April confirmation of J. Robert Flores as the new Administrator of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) and the August confirmation of Lawrence Greenfeld as Director of the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the new team at the Office of Justice Programs (OJP) is in place. I thought it might be useful to provide an update of the latest events as many of the recent changes within OJP will likely affect members of the American Society of Criminology.

Who is in charge of what?

Each of the five major units of OJP and some of the smaller OJP offices have changed leadership. The following is a list of the OJP agencies, the new Director of each, and a one sentence description of his/her background. (Fuller descriptive information can be found on each agency's website, which are all linked to the OJP homepage: <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov>).

Office of Justice Programs, Assistant Attorney General — Deborah J. Daniels, formerly with an Indianapolis law firm and a non-profit organization dedicated to community crime prevention and also United States Attorney for the Southern District of Indiana.

Bureau of Justice Statistics — Lawrence Greenfeld, formerly Deputy Director of BJS and a career federal employee with 20 years of experience with BJS.

National Institute of Justice — Sarah V. Hart, formerly Chief Counsel for the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections and also prosecutor in the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office for 16 years.

Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention — J. Robert Flores, formerly Vice President of the National Law Center for Children and Families and Deputy Chief in the Child Exploitation and Obscenity Unit of the U.S. Department of Justice for 10 years.

Bureau of Justice Assistance — Richard Nedelkoff, formerly Executive Director of the Texas Governor's Criminal Justice Division.

Office for Victims of Crime — John W. Gillis, formerly Commissioner of the California Board of Prison Terms and a 26-year veteran of the Los Angeles Police Department.

Violence Against Women Office — Diane Stuart, formerly State Coordinator for the Utah Domestic Violence Cabinet Council and director of a battered women's shelter in Logan, Utah.

The Drug Courts Program Office, the Corrections Program Office, the Office of Weed and Seed, and the Office for Domestic Preparedness have also seen some changes in leadership in the past year. Some of these offices have been folded into the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the Office of Domestic Preparedness may be headed for the new Department of Homeland Security. And at the COPS Office, the new Director is Carl R. Peed, formerly Director, Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice and Sheriff, Fairfax County, Virginia.

In addition to providing descriptive information about the Office of Justice Programs and its major units, the website has a new link to all awards made by OJP and COPS in Fiscal Year 2001 (ending September 30, 2001) — <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/fy2001grants>. This list includes all monies awarded by state, the vast majority of which are for funding of crime prevention assistance programs. Research awards are included in the state lists. The middle four letters of the award number denote the funding source. For example, awards made with NIJ funds are denoted by the 4 middle letters "IJCX". (However, many awards are made by NIJ with funds from other agencies such as the Violence Against Women office and these awards use the funding agency's code.)

New Directions at OJP

In addition to the regular leadership changes that occur after every presidential election, other important staff changes have been taking place. As many of you know, Sally T. Hillsman, Director of the Office of Research and Evaluation at NIJ for 7 years, left NIJ in early May for a new job as Executive Officer for the American Sociological Association. Dr. Hillsman has been a tenacious advocate for the use of science in understanding, controlling, and preventing crime and improving the administration of justice. She will be sorely missed. Thomas Feucht, Deputy Director of the Office of Research and Evaluation since 1997, is the Acting Director of NIJ's research office. Second, James Finckenaue, Director of NIJ's International Center since 1998, returned to Rutgers University in August. Also, Betty Chemers, formerly Deputy Administrator for OJJDP and also its Research Director for many years, has been temporarily assigned to the United Way to help with the Combined Federal Campaign, the annual fundraising activity for charitable contributions by federal employees.

Three ASC members are also part of the new NIJ. Margaret Zahn, former President of ASC and Dean at North Carolina State University has spent the past year as Director of the Violence and Victimization Research Division within NIJ's Office of Research and Evaluation, advising the NIJ leadership on funding priorities and new research areas. Marge left in August to go back to North Carolina, but she hopes to continue advising NIJ as a consultant. Bryan Vila of the University of Wyoming arrived in July to become the Director of the Crime Control and Prevention Research Division (i.e., policing research, crime mapping, and general crime prevention research). And Jay Albanese of Virginia Commonwealth University arrived in August to become the Director of the International Center.

Reorganization at OJP

As many of you know, at the direction of Congress, plans to reorganize the five major units and other components of the Office of Justice Programs have been under discussion for the last several years. (Actually, there have been proposals afloat within the Justice Department to reorganize OJP for at least the last decade.) The new leadership at OJP reviewed the reorganization plan submitted to the Congress by the former Assistant Attorney General, Laurie Robinson. Some significant changes were made in that plan and a revised plan was announced by Assistant Attorney General

Laurie Robinson. Some significant changes were made in that plan and a revised plan was announced by Assistant Attorney General Deborah Daniels in December, 2001. In its mid-year report, ASC's National Policy Committee summarized AAG Daniels' new plan:

Principles advocated in the report include such positive steps as eliminating duplication and overlap; improving responsiveness to customers; and enhancing coordination. The report recommends consolidating all statistics in BJS and all research in NIJ, and providing that a percentage of program money be allocated to NIJ "so that an appropriate and organized sampling of programs may be properly and objectively evaluated." There are troublesome questions about the independence of NIJ and BJS work raised by a number of the [plan's] provisions, however. These include statements regarding central control of both bureaus by the AAG, as well as a provision that the AAG shall make decisions on what statistical data BJS will compile. (emphasis added)

Any major changes in the reorganization of the Office of Justice Programs, including consolidation of research and statistics activities or changes in sign-off authority for research awards, will require new legislation which must be approved by the Judiciary committees in the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate, voted on by the full membership of both the House and Senate, and approved by the President. Although the Republican-controlled House Subcommittee on Crime is interested in moving forward on some reorganization of OJP, there is much less interest in the Democratic-controlled Senate. Thus, it is highly unlikely that any formal reorganization proposal will be enacted in this legislative session.

However, one technical change in the administration of OJP and its bureaus was statutorily enacted as part of the USA Patriot Act, signed into law by President Bush on October 26, 2001. The change gives the Assistant Attorney General "final authority over all *functions, including any grants, cooperative agreements, and contracts made or entered into for [all component organizations of OJP]. . . .*" (new language in italics). An exception to this authority exists for research and statistics grants awarded by NIJ, BJS, and OJJDP and there was no change in this exception.

This small word change giving OJP control over all agency "functions" is open to wide interpretation which could range from almost no impact on the operations of NIJ, BJS, and OJJDP to its use for justifying a final level of review by the Office of the Assistant Attorney General for OJP for almost all activities in these agencies, including publication decisions, content of solicitations for research proposals, management of the peer review process, personnel actions, and even including final review of some award decisions.

The independence of research and statistics within OJP has been vigorously advocated by many ASC Presidents, including our current President Larry Sherman and President-Elect John Laub, and former Presidents Alfred Blumstein, Charles Wellford, Joan Petersilia, and Delbert Elliott, among others. Former Directors of NIJ, BJS and OJJDP have also defended the special autonomy of research and statistics within OJP. In addition, current and former members of Congress have strongly supported the principle of the independence of research and statistics functions across the federal government. Thus, an extensive history on these issues exists, dating back to the 1970s — a history which one may hope will guide the actions of the new team at OJP.

The ASC Executive Board is monitoring these events through its connections as a member of COSSA (Consortium of Social Science Associations), through the National Policy Committee's work, and through ASC members in the Washington, D.C. area.

The Richness of Francophone Criminology and Belgian Chocolate

The eighth conference of the International Association of Francophone Criminologists (AICLF) was held in Liege, Belgium, from May 5-7th, 2002. I attended as part of the ASC's new tradition of sending "ambassadors" to criminology conferences abroad, and my French language skills were certainly a necessity for this task, since not a word of English was spoken for three days. This experience was again reminded of the importance of improving the links, strongly hampered by language barriers, between Francophone criminologists and English speaking criminologists in the United States.

The AICLF was founded in 1987 by Denis Szabo, currently at the Universite de Montreal, and besides publishing a newsletter and journal, the *Revue Internationale de Criminologie et de Police Technique et Scientifique*, has a conference every two years. At its founding, honorary members included, among others, Thorsten Sellin, one of America's most francophile criminologists. What was initially a very small organisation has grown considerably, especially since the last conference held in Montreal, Canada, so much that this year's conference hosted over 270 participants. Conference attendees came mainly from Belgium, Canada, France and Switzerland, although Morocco was represented and two criminologists from the Congo had expressed interest. Besides these Francophone countries, other French speaking criminologists were present from Greece, Portugal and Poland, as well as ASC's own Peter Grabosky.

Michel Born, a developmental psychologist at the Universite de Liege who is known for his work on adolescent crime, was the conference organiser, although the Ecole de Criminologie at the law school of Universite de Liege, headed up by Georges Kellen, also helped to organise the conference. Michel Born with the help of his diligent staff achieved a beautifully structured conference, and he was later elected the new President of the AICLF.

The theme for the conference this year was *Delinquance et Milieux de Vie*, Crime and Life Contexts. The programme was tightly organised around this theme; plenary speakers addressed such topics as a theoretical overview of how environments shape and are shaped by crime (a lucid synthesis by Maurice Cusson, Universite de Montreal, which ably linked the contributions of Chicago School, Belgian environmental criminologist Etienne de Greeff, French criminologist Jean Pinatel's theoretical work, Szabo's Canadian area studies, Wilson and Kelling's Broken Windows and Marcus Felson's work), drug policies as they differ in the political contexts of Europe and North America (a dynamic talk by Serge Brochu, Universite de Montreal), and victimisation of the aged (a passionate research expose by Robert Cario, Universite de Pau et des Pays de l'Adour). Apart from plenary sessions, the programme featured many panel sessions that again reflected the theme of life contexts and were highly empirical. In that respect, the particular strengths of developmental criminology were well evidenced by the Liege and Montreal traditions in this area, as well as the interesting work on white collar crime and crime in the workplace which is the strength of Kellens' criminology at the Ecole de Criminologie in Liege.

The AICLF has two prizes. One is the lifetime achievement Beaumont-Toqueville award in honour of the comparative penological work of those two French scholars, which this year was given to Raymond Gassin at the University of Aix en Provence, a renowned author of one of the major treatises in French criminology. Professor Gassin addressed the issue of the political environment of public officials in democratic societies in his acceptance speech, which was quite appropriate given that it was the day of the French elections. The young scholar award, named after Fernand Boulan, a French criminologist killed in a terrorist attack, was given to Marcelo Aebi, currently at the University of Seville, for his doctoral work on the validity of crime indicators for drug offenders, conducted as part of the heroin prescription evaluations in Switzerland. Besides these prizes, the AICLF also held a special reception, hosted by the Mayor of Liege, at which Denis Szabo was honoured for all his work in establishing francophone criminology.

Appropriately, the conference was sponsored by a regional insurance company (SMAP) which offers internships to Liege criminology students, as well as a local chocolatier (Charlemagne), and participants were given complimentary chocolate in their registration packets. The registration fee included all meals, nicely serviced at the University de Liege restaurant since the conference was held at the university campus, except for the gala dinner, held at the Liege Hotel School with music by a talented group of adolescents who sang songs by Jacques Brel and Queen equally well. The whole conference was welcoming towards young students, and an electronic network of Francophone student criminologists was announced.

The next conference will be held in the south of France, perhaps Toulouse or Agen, in 2004. There is indeed a great deal to be learned from the AICLF for ASC members: the skilled nurturing of a growing scientific community; the ability to effectively structure a conference around a single but versatile concept; and the value of searching for criminological patterns in comparative francophone contexts, that is, the wonderful richness of international comparative criminology united by a common language. It is this wonderful richness of francophone criminology that can only be compared to my gastronomic rediscovery of the incredible *luxe et volupte* of Belgian chocolate.
